steps at a Tokyo supermarket, a Berlin metro station and an Istanbul ferry. Then significant steps that change biographies, move populations, and seek new paths and ways. The work raises important questions to scrutinise the freedom or bondage of our own steps, to challenge media images with personal stories and to contrast personal moments with the pictures of faceless masses on the move. With this work, Berlin filmmaker Eva Stotz and Amsterdam tap dancer Marije Nie build on a successful cooperation in Istanbul where in 2013 they created *One Million Steps* – filmed during the 2013 Gezi Parc protests in Turkey.

This event will include guest performances by musicians from the Irish World Academy of Music and Dance and the Limerick community.

Eva Stotz is an award winning Berlin-based documentary filmmaker. *For full biog see page 29.*

Marije Nie is a musician with her feet, a dancing percussionist. The rhythm dictates the movement and the movement determines the sound. She is the recipient of the Jur Naessens prize for innovation in music.





SCREENDANCE IN THE GALLERY

DAYTIME MOVEMENTS BY BORIS CHARMATZ & AERNOUT MIK Film of dance? Filmed dance? Or phantom choreography, seeking in the very nature of movement the turbid matter of his imagination?

Daytime Movements by the artist Aernout Mik in collaboration with the choreographer Boris Charmatz places us at the border. In this "day dance" where the disorder of the bodies interferes in a daily environment, every gesture hides or reveals signs of a disturbing strangeness...

"In the silence and the interior entrenchment, the dancers seem to forget themselves and to form a body with the objects, with the landscapes, caught in a hypnotic trance that extends to the viewer through the immersive device of the installation. The violence of the gestures also imposes his emotions, questioning the passive and active positions. The camera films when approaching or detaching itself, constructing its language and its editing, creating its rhythm. Collaboration is also the risk-taking of research that continues in the territory of the other." - New National Museum of Monaco, 2016

Aernout Mik's work takes an ironic look at human behaviour placed in out-of-the-ordinary situations. His video installations present physical and psychological states instead of sequences ordered according to a linear narrative. Dancer and choreographer, Boris Charmatz has long been established as one of France's leading philosopher-choreographers. Some of his most well-known works include *Aatt enen tionon* (1996) and *danse de nuit* (2016).


WORKERS LEAVING THE FACTORY IN ELEVEN DECADES

Harun Farocki Germany | 2006 |Multi-screen video | 36'00'

When it comes to social conflict the area of 'in front of a factory' is very significant. When it comes to the private life of a film's character, which only begins after work, the factory is relegated to the background. Harun Farocki's *Workers Leaving the Factory in Eleven Decades* is largely based on research the artist conducted for an earlier piece similarly titled, *Workers Leaving the Factory* (1995). This earlier film was comprised of found footage relating to the same theme and accompanied by Farocki's narration. The 1995 piece was made around the centenary of the first cinematic film, *Workers Leaving the Lumiére Factory in Lyon*, 1895, by the early cinematographers Louis and Auguste Lumiére.

From 1967 onwards, **Harun Farocki** directed more than 120 films and installations that analysed contemporary life, and what he saw as its myriad depredations — war, imprisonment, surveillance, capitalism — through the visual stimuli that attend them. His work has been the subject of major exhibitions at the Museum of Modern Art in New York, the Tate Modern in London and elsewhere. Farocki died in July 2014.

VANISHING POINT

Rosemary Butcher UK |2004 | Single screen video | 16'00" loop

With the figure of Elena Giannotti set against the desert in Andalucia, Spain and comprising principally of one shot and with only three cuts, *Vanishing Point* is a moving evocation of women's position in an often maledominated society.

As one of the most singular British choreographers of her generation, **Rosemary Butcher** was a seminal figure in postmodern dance. Largely eschewing the strictures of formal choreography, she was preoccupied with exploring movement in new and innovative ways that bound conceptual ideas to execution often to deliberately provocative ends. Butcher made radical and innovative works that crossed the disciplines of choreography and visual arts before she sadly passed away in 2016. After returning to the UK from New York in the 1970s, Butcher often explored non-theatrical spaces - galleries, architectural and open sites - for presenting her works, and has worked with designers, film makers and dancers, making key choreographic film works including Vanishing Point and SCAN.

DOLL CLOTHES

Cindy Sherman USA | 1975 | Super 8mm shown on video | 2'22"

Doll Clothes presents a photograph of the artist, Cindy Sherman, as a paper doll that has come to life, trying on multiple outfits before a mirror. After each costume change a hand intrudes from the corner of the screen, putting the doll and her dress back in their plastic album sleeves. The repetition of posing followed by powerlessness reflects Sherman's on-going fascination with the politics of identity and representation, particularly in relation to women.

Cindy Sherman (American, b. 1954) is widely recognized as one of the most important and influential artists in contemporary art. Throughout her career, she has presented a sustained, eloquent, and provocative exploration of the construction of contemporary identity and the nature of representation, drawn from the unlimited supply of images from movies, TV, magazines, the Internet, and art history.

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CARRIAGEWORKS /

24 FRAMES PER SECOND

24 Frames Per Second is a ground-breaking project developed by Sydney based contemporary multi-arts centre Carriageworks, curated by Beatrice Gralton and Nina Miall. 2017 sees the fourth and final year of the collaboration between Light Moves and Carriageworks. Since 2014 the festival has showcased works from the cutting edge project 24 Frames Per Second, a major exhibition of 24 commissioned screen-based works by 18 Australian and 6 international artists. Located in Limerick City Gallery of Art (LCGA), the installations will be exhibited for the period of the festival in November and until January 2018 as part of the LCGA's own programme.

I CAN RELATE

Alison Currie 2015 | Video projection and sculpted screen | 4'00" loop

I Can Relate is a video, dance and sculpture work presented on a sculpted projection screen in a gallery format. The moving image of a solo dancer interacts with the sculptural form of the screen encompassing a landscape of large granite rocks. It explores the fundamental comparison or form between dancer and the rocks. The work is inspired from the simple narrative of comparison between object in this case rock and human in this case a dancer and the greater relationship to landscape.

This piece is an attempt to place the participants in a situation where they can be swept up in the ridiculousness and sublime joy of unbridled creativity. The significance of this work is to be found in the interaction with the work itself and specifically in the musical and facial interaction or duet between the two players. It opens a space in which our preconceptions around emotive facial cues and responses can be challenged. Interaction is encouraged with keyboards positioned in front of each projection so the editing process is essentially handed over to the audience.

Escaping from the theatre, a fugitive in the desert: simultaneously dancing and singing, celebrating the sweetest choice of solitude. *The Sweetest Choice* captures in a single sequence the awkward intensity of this ambiguous presence in magnificent and yet dangerous landscapes from the Californian Death Valley. César Vayssié and François Chaignaud imagine a cycle of 5 versions of this unusual ritual, based on Henry Purcell's aria *Oh Solitude* danced, sung and shot in 5 different locations.



TALK Erika Balsom

Moving Bodies: Capture and Control in the Late Works of Harun Farocki

Erika Balsom is a scholar and critic focusing on the history of the moving image in art and experimental documentary practices. Her most recent book, *After Uniqueness: A*



History of Film and Video Art in Circulation, was published by Columbia University Press in 2017. She is author of *Exhibiting Cinema in Contemporary Art* (2013), the co-editor of *Documentary Across Disciplines* (2016), and a frequent contributor to *Artforum* and *Sight and Sound*. Her work has appeared in publications such as *Grey Room, e-flux, Cinema Journal*, and numerous exhibition catalogues. She is senior lecturer in Film Studies at King's College London and holds a PhD in Modern Culture and Media from Brown University.

From its very beginnings, the cinematic apparatus subjected human and animal movement to unprecedented forms of quantification and analysis, serving as a technique for the management of life itself. And yet at the same time, it opened new realms of visibility by recording the ephemeralities of our world in time – a vocation now under threat as computergenerated images increasingly displace lens-based images. In this talk, Erika Balsom will explore this ambivalence of capture through a consideration of the late works of Harun Farocki.

INTERVIEW Bodies in Time - Embracing History in Screendance: Fearghus Ó Conchúir, Aine Stapleton and David Bolger

Artistic director of CoisCéim Dance Theatre **David Bolger** (Falling Out of Standing, p. 17), choreographer **Fearghus Ó Conchúir** (I'm Roger Casement, p. 20) and dance artist and filmmaker **Áine Stapleton** (Medicated Milk, p. 20) discuss their work and influences in this interview style talk.

In his work **David Bolger** embraces various dance styles as a creative device to demonstrate and articulate stories and emotions that are relevant to the landscapes in which we live. David pushes the boundaries in creating and presenting contemporary dance theatre to Irish and international audiences.

Fearghus Ó Conchúir is an independent choreographer and dance artist who frequently collaborates with artists and experts from other disciplines. His latest work, *The Casement Project*, focuses on the life of Roger Casement and reinforces the connection between Casement's crossing of identity borders, his openness to the erotic stranger and the experiences of people today seeking to cross national boundaries.

Áine Stapleton's poignant and beautiful work is rooted in dance and film and often draws from her personal story. In *Medicated Milk*, Stapleton, whose own narrative mirrors Lucia's, shows a unique interpretation of the story through experimental dance and music.






